What is OEM?

The Office of Emergency Management (OEM) is a local government department that provides for the health, safety and welfare of residents during times of emergency and disaster. Emergency Management has an active role in towns and cities nationwide, and focuses on municipal preparedness, response and recovery from all types of natural and manmade disasters. OEM managers work closely with local Fire Companies, First Aid Squads, Departments of Public Works, and Health Departments to coordinate activities and resources for maximum effectiveness.

There are several things you can do to be better prepared for an emergency. The Washington Township OEM encourages all residents to:

Plan Ahead

Create a family emergency plan based on what you've learned from previous events. Identify your needs and plan for them. Consider family members, pets, and the elderly in your plans. Consider combining resources with neighbors.

Stay Informed

Know how and where to get information. Familiarize yourself with available resources, explore helpful websites, and sign up for emergency alerts and notifications BEFORE you need them.

Be Prepared

Have nonperishable food, water, batteries, medicines, fuel, cash and a portable radio on hand. Have your utility service provider and insurance company contact information on hand. Keep vehicles fueled and serviced. If you have a generator, know how to use it safely. If you rely on well water, have a backup plan if it stops working.



Get Involved

Response Team (CERT) program
helps train residents to be better
prepared to respond to emergency
situations in their communities. To

you must complete an application
and pass a background check.

Reverse 911 alerts

When critical emergency information need to be shared, Washington Township will utilize the official E911 system to issue alerts and notifications by phone to all residential and business land line (non-cellular) telephones. You will receive these alerts automatically, and no signup is

required.

Receive spoken alerts on your mobile phone

Residents can also receive Reverse 911 alerts on their cell phones. To register multiple mobile phone numbers for each household, go to www.morrisoem.org and select Register for Alerts. You will be asked to create an account and specify the mobile numbers that will receive alerts and notifications.

Radio

Local radio station WRNJ is a valuable community resource in broadcasting timely information to the public. Tune in at 1510 AM, 104.7 FM, or 92.7 FM.
